

Save life with Naloxone – a nasal spray that reverses an opioid overdose

Knowing the signs and symptoms of an opioid overdose

Unconscious, no respons when you call the person's

name or rub the middle of their chest.



Abnormal breathing, can be like snoring, grunting or gasping

Small pupils, "pinpoint pupils" Blue lips and nails



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Overdose? Do this:

1. Open airway

Lay the person on the back and open the airway by tilting the head and lifting the chin.



4. No breathing?

Give 2 rescue breaths every 10 seconds.



2. Call 112

Always get emergency medical help, even if the person wakes up. Naloxone is not a substitute for emergency medical care or CPR*.

5. No respons within 2 minutes?

Administer a second dose. Give rescue breaths until emergency medical help arrives.



3. Administer Naloxone

Insert the tip of the nozzle into one nostril and give the dose of Naloxone.



Please note! Do not test before use. One nasal spray contains only 1 dose.

6. Normal breathing?

Move the person on their side (recovery position). Stay with the person until emergency medical help arrives.
